PW is partnering with Michael Pirson, William J. Loschert Endowed Chair in Social Entrepreneurship at Fordham University's Gabelli School of Business, to implement the PW ARC Process in Fordham's business school curriculum. The sophomore year curriculum is already team-based, making it relatively easy to set up a randomized control trial comparing explicit training in ACT and the CDPs with Fordham's current team-based pedagogy.

Data from the fall 2020 semester is currently being analyzed. Preliminary results show a strong relationship between group performance and implementation of the CDPs in both treatments and only minor differences between treatments, suggesting that Fordham's current team-based method is already quite effective. The fact that this is a long-term research collaboration means that more refined questions can be addressed every year, based on the results of the previous year. This is precisely the kind of research partnership that we seek to establish with many schools and organizations to build compelling case studies that we can use to procure more partnerships.

Optimism, Cynicism, and Realism

Is realism invariably corrosive of hope? Or can realists also be optimists? Do we need delusions to maintain psychological stability? If so, delusions about what? Ourselves? Human nature? Our fate? Dark portrayals of human nature are often hailed as starkly realistic, and rosier portrayals are often assumed to stem from "rose-colored glasses." But is this right? Or is it the cynics and pessimists that suffer from "negativity bias"? What light can the science of evolution shed on the subject? What will happen when we pool our insights?

Care to explore a bit beforehand? Start here:

"Logicality in regard to practical matters is the most useful quality an animal can possess, and might, therefore result from the action of natural selection; but outside of these it is probably of more advantage to the animal to have his mind filled with pleasing and encouraging visions, independently of their truth; and thus, upon unpractical subjects, natural selection might occasion a fallacious tendency of thought."

TVOL SPOTLIGHT

Multilevel Selection (MLS) is a theoretical framework that originated for the study of genetic evolution but is just as useful for the study of cultural evolution. MLS theory begins with the fact that evolution takes place in a nested hierarchy of units, such as from genes to ecosystems in biological systems and from small groups to the global scale in human systems. Natural selection at the smallest scale—between individuals within socially interacting groups—tends to favor disruptive self-serving behaviors. It is only at the scale of between-group selection that cooperation within groups is favored, and cooperative groups become selfish actors in between-group competition unless selection acts at still higher scales.

With this in mind, there is added value in examining a cultural practice called Agile, which originated in the context of software development, has diversified to a number of other contexts (mostly within the business world) and is largely unknown beyond those borders. Our guide is Laurent Alt, who became part of the Agile movement early in its history and also has become literate in cultural MLS theory and its practical applications in real-world settings. Thus, not only is Laurent qualified to serve as our guide about Agile but also to comment upon the added value of thinking about Agile from an explicitly MLS perspective.
